# Lesson Plan: Leah's Magic Dreidel

#### Audience: Jewish Classroom (Grades 1-3)

- Learning Goals
- Deepen understanding of dreidel symbols and meanings
- Reflect on the power of wishes and unintended consequences
- Explore the idea of appreciating what you already have

### † 1. Warm-Up (5–7 min)

Prompt: What's something you've wished for... and what happened next? Highlight unexpected results.

Write a few answers on the board. Highlight outcomes that didn't go as planned.

### □ 2. Read-Aloud (15 min)

Pause after each major wish to reflect. Ask students if they'd make the same wish and why.

- After the math wish: "Would you have made that wish?"
- After the dog chaos: "What would you do with that many dogs?"
- After the clothing mishap: "Why did that wish go wrong?"
- At the end: "Why did Leah stop and think before her final wish?"

## 3. Mini-Lesson: Dreidel Symbols (5 min)

Review meanings of  $\mathbf{u}$ ,  $\mathbf{n}$ ,  $\mathbf{n}$ , and what kind of wish might go with each. Draw a dreidel on the board and review the Hebrew letters:

- a (Gimmel) "You get everything"
- 1 (Nun) "You get nothing"
- (Hay) "You get half"
- ש (Shin) "You give one away"

#### Ask students:

"What kind of wish might go with each letter?"

## **4.** Activity: Dreidel Wish Spinner (15 min)

Distribute blank dreidel templates. Students decorate their dreidel and write:

- One wish
- What they think would happen
- What might go wrong if the wish came true

## ★ 5. Wrap-Up Discussion (5–8 min)

- "Why do you think Leah chose to undo her wishes?"
- "Is it better to wish for something magical, or make things better in real life?"
- The first time Leah wished, she spun first, and then made her wish.
  Look back at the book and highlight that things started to go wrong when she wished first and then spun. Things only get back under control when she remembers, at the end of the book, to spin first and then wish. What do you think she learned along the way?
